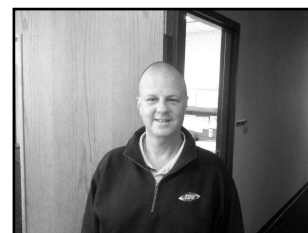

## Marc Violette Retires

After joining the family phone business at age 12, Marc Violette, market manager for TDS Telecommunications Corp. (TDS®) has retiring. His last day with TDS was December 31.

"I learned the business from the ground up," says Marc Violette. "When I was 12, I helped my dad by doing janitorial work on weekends in the telephone office in Contoocook. I'd go on rides to do repairs and empty pay phones. I learned how to drive on a bucket truck."



His run continued in jobs that spanned both the technical and operational sides of the telecom business. Since 2006 Violette has been the market manager for TDS working in New Hampshire, Maine, Vermont, New York, and Pennsylvania. "Marc has been a dedicated employee, and I commend him for his outstanding service and unwavering commitment to our customers and employees," says Dave Wittwer, President and CEO of TDS. "I will always remember Marc for his kind heart and forthright approach."

Violette, who is from New Hampshire, grew up in the industry. Violette's great-grandfather was general manager of Merrimack Telephone Company in 1928. After returning from WWII, Violette's grandfather worked at Merrimack. Then, in the late-1950s, he purchased Hopkinton Telephone Company in Contoocook, NH, and merged it with Merrimack. In 2001, TDS acquired the company.

After his retirement, it will be the first time in 84 years no member of the Violette family is involved with the local telephone company. In the New Year, Violette plans to obtain his real estate license and join his wife in the property management and rental business. He says, "It's a great opportunity to go out and do something I've never done before. I love challenges, and I'm very competitive. I still have two kids in college. I'm not going to go lie on a beach; that's not me." He adds that even though no Violette will be associated with a telecom company, he's not totally leaving the telephone industry. Beginning in January 2013, Violette became the Executive Vice President of the Telephone Association of New England.

## *Six properties added to N.H. State Register of Historic Places*

The New Hampshire Division of Historical Resources is pleased to announce that the State Historical Resources Council has added six additional properties to the New Hampshire State Register of Historic Places. The most recent additions to the New Hampshire State Register of Historic Places are:

**Chichester's Town House**, which now serves as the town library, was built on the site of the town's 18th-century meeting house. Completed in 1847, it has been the seat of town government as well as the library and central meeting place for residents for more than 150 years.

**Freedom Village Bandstand**, built by 1902 and host to Old Home Day concerts for more than a century, was added to the State Register as part of ongoing work to document the history of Freedom's Schoolhouse Hill. It has been the center of town events since its construction.

**The Grafton Town Library** existed simply as a traveling collection of books until this Colonial Revival building was constructed in 1921. Its concrete blocks were created on site, using money-saving volunteer labor. The library is viewed as the town's way of paying tribute to the importance of learning.

**Keene's Horatio Colony House Museum** was constructed in phases: its main building was begun circa 1806, an ell was added circa 1877, a renovation took place in 1898, and additional changes were completed in the 1930s. The building is significant for its architecture, which reflects both its original Federal period of construction as well as its evolution throughout the Victorian era.

Constructed in 1810 as a tavern, the former **Red Hill House** in Moultonborough was purchased in 1893 by the newly formed Moultonborough Grange #197 to serve as its hall. Renovated from 1903 - 1904, it remains an excellent example of a grange hall, with its large meeting hall and stage, as well as its series of entries leading to the grange meeting spaces.

**Nelson's 1846 Greek Revival Town Hall** is the third town hall built in the community and is an outstanding example of frugality and reuse as it incorporates much of the framing from the second town hall. The building sits on the common and embodies not only the history of the town, but also serves as an example of the functional, adaptable structures common to rural small town government in New Hampshire.

## AMERICAN LEGION AMATEUR RADIO OPERATORS NEEDED

Hurricane Sandy will go down in the record books as one of the most severe storms of all times, according to one source, "the second-most powerful storm only to Hurricane Isabel in 2003." This storm created massive flooding, power outages, loss of property and many lives were lost. Not only was there rain and wind but snowfall up to two feet in some areas.

With the loss of power, ham operators from The American Legion Amateur Radio Club (TALARC) sprang into action. The club is "a nationwide volunteer unit that can and does aid the local community, state and national emergency officials during civil or natural disasters such as Hurricane Sandy. The strength of this organization is in the local communities where they live."

They assisted homeland security efforts in communities by developing emergency kits and plans; by remaining informed and assisting schools, workplaces and communities in developing emergency plans and checklists; and by cooperating with local councils of the Citizens Corps, Emergency Management.

The club was established in May 2011 and has quickly grown in membership. This association of military veterans and family who share an interest in and are licensed as amateur radio operators will have plenty to do during an emergency situation. There is a great need for more ham operators. ## **Safety Measures at Simonds School**

These are the safety procedures we follow at Simonds School. We are fortunate to work closely with our Police and Fire Departments and have the support of many emergency responders, town agents and officials.

- **Locked Doors.** Our school has a video camera and an automatic locking system so that Mrs. Grimes and I can lock and unlock the door from our desks. We also have an optimal vantage point to see all people and vehicles entering school grounds. The door by the MPR is kept locked all day and only unlocked after school for parent pick up from Boys & Girls Club and after school events.

- **Safety Drills.** We have multiple drills that cover many kinds of emergencies. We are proud of the fact that we can evacuate the building and line up on the field in less than two minutes. Our record is 1 minute and 49 seconds.

Drills include:

**Lock Down** - Secure classroom, lock door, pull shade, shut-off lights, go to identified spot.

**Shelter in Place / Hazardous Materials** - Duct tape all doors and windows to seal cracks

**Fire** – Evacuate to field using safest route. Take attendance.

**Off-site Evacuation** – Exit building following instructions, walk to United Church or identified site.

**Reverse Evacuation** - Bell will ring. Children come into building; attendance taken.

**Drop / Extreme Weather** - Crouch under desk or table, cover head, face away from windows.

**Bus Evacuation** – Follow bus driver's instructions, practice exiting through rear door of bus.

**Identification Badges** - All staff and visitors are to wear an identification badge that is visible. Students are trained to look for the badge if being given a direction by someone they do not know.

**Alert Now** - In the event of a safety issue, parents are notified by our automatic phone call system. They are instructed about any situation and where and when to pick up children, should that be necessary.

Our three school rules are Be Safe, Be Respectful, Be Responsible for Learning. Our students and staff know that safety is our first and most important rule. Our procedures and routines are another part of learning for our students.

**Borrow eBooks on OUR Nook Color or Kindle:** if you don't have a device but want to try one, or want to read a book we cannot borrow, ask us to consider getting it for you to read on our eBook readers that we lend out! This is especially useful if you need larger type but available paper versions are only in small print. Borrower must be over 18, and the loan period is 2 weeks.

**COMING IN 2013: New catalog and checkout software!** The Trustees have decided to move forward with a new Integrated Library System (ILS), offered at a group pricing rate through a NH consortium called nhaisLOCAL organized by the NH State Library. The system is an open-source web-based program called KOHA, and will provide many modern features such as personal accounts which allow item hold requests, list-making, messaging to library staff, automatic reminders, etc. We don't know as yet when we will be scheduled for the change, but you can try a demo at [bywatersolutions.com](http://bywatersolutions.com) (KOHA demo tab, select Public OPAC) to see what it is like.
